

If you're resolving to lose weight this year, Odie's story will be an inspiration to you! Here's his story told by his Final Refuge mom Bilyana:

"Odie was surrendered to the Everett shelter in August of 2015 because (per paperwork) his family was moving and couldn't take him



along. We don't know much of his history other than the fact that 11 years earlier he had been adopted from the Everett shelter by this owner(s). On intake to the shelter last year he was estimated to be 15 years old and weighed 24 pounds! Odie joined my household on August 22nd. Pretty quickly after he came to me I got him in for a vet check up and a thorough grooming. Odie's teeth were in bad shape and he needed to have 15 extracted. (He was already missing four and I found two which had fallen in my house because of advanced decay.) Thankfully, other than his obesity, he was found to otherwise be in great health.



"I approached Odie's weight loss through both food and exercise. I was told his target weight would be around 15-16 pounds. My own two dogs are exactly that weight so I had a very clear sense of what portions Odie would need to eat to maintain that weight. I started to gradually decrease his portion size until it resembled that of my other

two pups. We at first started Odie on Purina OM (Overweight Management) wet food—wet food due to his recently extracted teeth and OM because it was very low fat. Odie had a hard time walking for longer stretches at first; between his short legs and giant belly, he was almost dragging across the floor! He could only sleep on his back basically, because his belly was always in the way, and he panted a lot more than would have made sense given the weather. Thankfully Odie was very interested in going for walks, especially when he would see me walk my own puppies; he'd always want to join in. So I made sure we went for a walk every day, gradually increasing the distance (although even at their longest they were still short walks). I also have a fenced in back yard and a doggie door so Odie gets to roam at his leisure during the day.

"Two months after he came to me, Odie was at his target weight of 15.5lb, was no longer panting and was sleeping so well! We took him off the Purina OM food and he now enjoys the same food as all pups in the household. He has maintained that general weight since then! Odie is still incredibly food



motivated. I make sure treats are not excessive and are healthy—a baby carrot, a piece of apple, a raw green bean. To my amusement, Odie is the only dog in the house who dislikes bananas. One of his quirks is about the food bowl; he gets fed morning and evening, but at random times during the day he will go check his food bowl just in case food magically appeared in it.

"Odie has a huge personality packed into his now very svelte body. From the first day he walked into my house he showed himself to be very assertive and at times bossy. He has strong opinions about things he likes (such as meeting people) and things he dislikes (such as being picked up). Odie very quickly bonded with me and started following and seeking me out. He loves to be within a foot of me and his version of being a lap dog is to get the front half of his long body in my lap.







"Odie really enjoys meeting people and is very sociable. This has made him a wonderful greeter dog at ODH events and over the last year we have attended quite a few. It turns out Odie loves cats and has excellent manners around them (other dogs he mostly just tolerates). When we go to a vet check up we make sure to ask to visit with the resident cat because of how much Odie loves her.

"As all wiener dogs, Odie gets a kick out of burrowing under a blanket and is often napping completely covered or with just the tip of his nose out. He absolutely loves his heated bed and spends lots of time in it. Short walks are a definite favorite and we periodically make sure to go to the local lake where

"Being overweight puts your dog or cat at risk of many diseases, not least of them diabetes, cardiovascular disease and arthritis."

GEOFFREY (AKA PEANUT)

"Peanut landed at a shelter because the city took him away from his home because of neglect. By the time they did, Peanut was in such bad shape, and it was evident this old pup had endured neglect and abuse. Peanut was clearly a very special boy, and he became a favorite among the volunteers, especially



Volunteer Rescue Coordinator Erica. Erica said Peanut was loving and so grateful for even a pat on the head. She notified Judith about him, and I was the lucky one to receive this snuggly guy. As we got to know each other and Peanut's personality emerged, he seemed to me more like a kindly and distinguished English Gentleman than a Peanut, so we began calling him Geoffrey.

"And so, Geoffrey has been very busy healing! He's growing stronger all the time in both body and in spirit. Here are some examples of the progress he's making: In the beginning, G's tail sort of barely wagged, and then only the very tip of the tail. Now he wags like a happy helicopter. To start with, G needed to gain weight and take lots of medicine! Except he wouldn't eat. Hmm. But, once I added yogurt and peanut butter to his dog food, he was happy and game to eat. Still, he was too smart and stubborn for the pills. Tina's tip worked: encase the pills in gel caps (I found them in different sizes at the health food store), and I stuck those into gobs of peanut butter. Yum! In time, Geoffrey gained 20 pounds. His bones no longer stick out everywhere, and he has muscle tone too from his 'walks.' Since he started out wobbly and very weak, we began by going less than a block at a time. These days, two miles is fun for him, and he can even trot comfortably as we stroll. For months, Peanut would only lie down, maybe he'd stand. More and more, he experiments with sitting down for a spell, and for longer spells all the time. He gets a pill of fish oil daily; that's got to be helping.

"Thanks to a new fangled allergy medicine called Apoquel Peanut no longer has skin issues. Thank goodness! Most of the fur toward his back end wasn't there, and his teeth are extremely worn down from constant chewing. He wore a pup jacket for his first months both for warmth and so people wouldn't immediately notice and react to his physical state. Along with his body filling out, his fur has since grown in thick and luxurious. He's oh so handsome; people tell him that now all the time, and more and more often he lets them.





"As Geoffrey first became stronger, he started acting out toward other dogs through 'resource guarding' food and me. Not good! G weighs 80 pounds now. His pup sister Wylee weighs only 13, and she's a feisty terrier mix, so she'd egg him on. I worried for her. Then, the dreaded "separation anxiety" became an issue. It was scary for both of us the day I left him home for a short while, and I returned to find a damaged door with a badly dented doorknob, plus a long windowsill cleared of its objects, including the glassy ones (thank goodness none of those broke on the way down, and the window still was whole).

I cannot express in words how much these little booklets helped. Especially this one for separation anxiety: I'll Be Home Soon! "ODH also sent us to school for G's new issues. We started classes at Great Dog Obedience School in North Seattle. It's a fine school and community. Great Dog also included Peanut in their ODH Christmas tree gifting program; these folks were so generous to our boy. Among other goodies, G received a huge orthopedic bed; that's where I usually find our fellow.

"Geoffrey goes to Green Lake Animal Hospital for his medical care. They've been a Godsend for our boy, and during G's toughest time, they prescribed G what's considered a half dose for him of Prozac. This helped G feel less startled too by noises, etc.

"We're close with my sister and her family. Her kids and their dog Sydney adore Geoffrey and they continue to learn big life lessons from this humorous, dead pan guy about responsibility, family, love, faith, joy and of course ... comedy. G is also very popular in my neighborhood; last night it snowed, and Geoffrey was gleeful. He ran around, he played, and he ate lots of fluffy snow in our courtyard with his sister dog Wylee, our fabulous neighbors and lucky me!

"Geoffrey is a little miracle. It's lovely to watch as he gets to know a life filled with health, safety, play, trust and love. As G continues to heal and grow, all of us around him do too. Geoffrey brings out the heart and compassion in just about everybody. He demonstrates that change is totally possible. G has taught me about being brave, and that life goes best when we continue to grow, love, and to go for it, regardless of the outcome. Geoffrey teaches Wylee how to slow down, and that one can be mellow and steady without blowing a gasket. Wylee Pup teaches Geoffrey about joy, happiness and play, and about loving and trusting people."

Once again, thanks to Gretchen Howell (pictured with Bev Bowe, Floyd, Norman and Maxx Throttle) of Dachshund Race for Rescue, ODH was represented in the halftime Wiener Races on December 4 during the Seahawks game against the Panthers. Floyd ran for ODH and even though he didn't win, we're very proud of him for being such a good sport. Special thanks to the Seahawks who made a very generous donation to ODH in

honor of the winner: Maxx Throttle, Floyd's new brother.

That's just the bare bones of a story that's much bigger than an appearance by an ODH dog at a football game. Let's start with Bev Bowe who was Floyd's first foster mom:

"In May I learned about an abandonment case in Everett, where five dogs and 30+ cats had been left in a condemned mansion. Four of the dogs were old Dachshunds. I spoke with ODH director/founder Judith, who told me that all of the Wieners had bad teeth but two in particular had pretty horrible mouths needing serious treatment. Being retired gives me a flexible schedule and the time to commit to a dog that needs more than average care so I told her I would take the "worst mouth" of the bunch. I drove straight to the shelter to see what I was getting. What I 'got' was the happiest, friendliest little fellow I had ever seen in a Dachshund body! I immediately fell in love with this guy!

"When I brought Floyd home Judith warned me that being a Wiener, Floyd probably had back issues and I shouldn't let him on the bed or couch. At the end of the first day I contacted her and asked her what army was going to stop him! Floyd was zipping all over the house, up and over the couch, on and off the bed, zooming everywhere he went in happy abandon. The shelter had estimated Floyd's age as 11, but one look at him told me he was a LOT younger, and very adoptable, if we could just get his mouth fixed up. I did try to keep Floyd on the floor, and every night would tuck him into his bed on the floor next to mine – and every morning I would wake up to him under my covers, nestled against me.

"I began to consider adopting Floyd; he fit into my little family so well, and he is such a great little dog I was worried I would have a hard time choosing a proper home for him: I knew I could give him a wonderful home for the rest of his life and the idea of sending him off into an unknown future was hard for me to face. Then Tina Nabseth called me and asked if I thought Floyd would be a good entrant in the Race for Rescue Seahawk Wiener Dog Race. I said a very thrilled yes and Tina and I then met with Gretchen Howell, who organizes the Wiener Race. I brought Floyd

with me to that first meeting. As soon as I met Gretchen and saw her look at Floyd with instant love I realized that she would be the perfect mom for Floyd.

"Old Dog Haven does so much for the dogs that go through our system, but we fosters get so much out of the experience too. I'm feeling blessed to have had the opportunity to help Floyd on his journey to a loving forever home!"

Now, let's hear from Floyd's forever mom Gretchen:

"It was apparent that Floyd started out life as a show-dog. He knows how to hold a "stack" indefinitely. I called AKC hoping to discover his true identity, but with no chip or tattoo it wasn't possible. Their DNA records were incomplete, so doing a DNA test wasn't going to help either. Over the next nine weeks, Floyd was registered under AKC's PAL program, entered 'school', and earned his AKC Canine Good Citizen title.

"Floyd also started learning how to race. One of my other Dachshunds, Maxx Throttle, is well-titled in short-course racing (Dachshund dragracing...yes, the sport started with a beer commercial!). He also has 15 other obedience and coursing related titles with AKC and UKC. His pack mate, Ben Norman, also has a collection of titles and wins, and works as "Ben The Camera Dog" at



the Seahawks races. It is a good fit – Floyd has two slightly older dogs to act as his mentors. He even earned some points toward AKC's BCAT title, just like his foster brothers.

"Floyd has some quirks. We named his bed "Wilson" because Floyd has an argument with it every night before he goes to sleep (rather like Wilson the Basketball from the movie *Castaway*). When he wants my attention, he will poke me in the leg, Borzoi style. Floyd also channels his inner "Sheldon Cooper character" from *Big Bang Theory*: if the poke is ignored, it's tap-tap -tap with his paw (always three taps). Usually a silent dog, his occasional (and for no particular reason) full-volume "YAP!" could wake the dead.

"12/4/16 was a triple win for my pack. Maxx Throttle won 1st place at Seahawks Race for Rescue. Old Dog Haven got a nice donation from Seahawks. Floyd became officially AKC's Old Dog Haven Floyd Von Howell, CGC, owned by me!

"So much for not being able to teach an old dog new tricks..."

Thank you Bev and Gretchen. See you at the races, Floyd!


