Have you ever thought about what it would be like to be blind? How would you feel if your sight gradually (or suddenly) disappeared? Would you be able to adjust to living productively in your world without the use of your eyes?

This feature introduces you to three Old Dog Haven dogs that are blind. The lessons they offer in terms of resiliency, adaptability, and strength of character will inspire you to understand that there's more to life than being able to see with your eyes.

# MARVIN by Dawn Ford

Marvin came to us three years ago, and although we were experienced with senior pekingese pups, we were new to having a blind dog and honestly we weren't sure what to expect.

We picked up 12- year- old Marvin and the learning began! He learned our small floor plan and where the food/water bowls were within a few days. He learned to walk on leash (he loves walks) within a few months and within the year he had conquered our doggie door into the back yard! In the three years we have had him, he has



only had two accidents. Two! Marvin is ah-mazing. He is so patient; if I get frustrated for him with certain challenges, he just shrugs it off and tries again.

After Marvin's arrival we started him a bucket list, with goals of going to the beach, camping, eating a Dick's burger, doggie ice cream, entering a costume contest, etc. It was a long list, but it was completed within the year. Marvin loves an adventure, especially if it involves a beach. The smells at the beach are pure heaven to a blind dog!

He can even spell his name!

On Marvin's first camping trip to Oregon, there was a large family with kids camping across from us. Needless to say, with three dogs, we had the kids at our campsite a lot! The kids were very curious about all of our dogs but they had a lot of questions about Marvin. I thought I was being a really good advocate for a dog with a disability but one kid commented, "I feel sorry for Marvin." The other kids all chimed in that they felt sorry for Marvin too. I said, "Oh NO! Don't feel sorry for Marvin; feel proud of Marvin! Marvin doesn't feel sorry for himself. Marvin is proud of all he can do without being able to see!" Then the same kid said, "I feel proud

of Marvin!" and I said "Yay!" Then the other kids chimed in that they were proud of Marvin too, which felt great!

Marvin is popular in our neighborhood because we go for a lot of walks and I guess it isn't every day that you see a blind dog on a walk! We learned how to walk him with a retractable leash; I would walk backwards in front of him and he'd follow my voice. I'm sure we looked nuts but I don't care. He then learned that route by smells and I could walk behind him guiding him when needed with the leash. I know people are against retractable leashes but it works great for walking a blind dog! We conquered a block, then two blocks and finished last summer doing three miles with some jogging intervals in the mix! He has slowed down more recently and is happier with a shorter walk. I always let him decide the route and we go at his pace, which can be painstakingly slow but it's his adventure and I'm just along for the ride. Not long after we started walking and started going farther and farther, we passed a little girl on the sidewalk. She was staring at Marvin but passed us without saying anything. She got a little farther up the sidewalk and called out, "Is that dog blind-ed?" I replied, "Yes, he is!" and she said, "OH! I've heard about him!" She's heard about him? What! Made me smile the rest of the day thinking of Marvin being the talk of the neighborhood!

We have had people tell us how great we are for taking a dog with challenges like Marvin and my husband and I are always quick to respond that Marvin is the BEST dog we have ever had! Of course we LOVE all of our dogs 110% but Marvin is soo sweet, trusting, silly, confident . . . the list goes on! You just cannot have a bad day with Marvin around. I always whisper in his ear that he is my Best Boy and I truly mean it. I will be devastated when he is no longer with us, but I will know confidently that he had the best life with us and us with him. There will be no regrets.

# MOPSIE by Bonnie Orban

Mopsie was a stray taken to the local Humane Society. Because her eyes and teeth were in such terrible shape Old Dog Haven was contacted and took her into their care. Both of her eyes were damaged, painful and needed to be removed. She was also in need of dental care. As her medical

needs were being taken care of, she settled happily into a temporary foster home. When she was fully recovered, Mopsie came to us.

Mopsie carefully learned the first floor of our house. She does not try stairs. She does not run or jump up onto furniture but can slide off of the couch when she wants off and no one is around. She is very careful when she moves and senses where the edges of furniture are. When she needs to go outside, she will go to a door and bark to let us know.

She loves to be outside in the sun and will dance around in a circle and bark. She is a favorite of the neighbors who enjoy coming to visit her. She enjoys wandering around the yard exploring the grass and plants.

Mopsie is so sweet! She loves attention and does a little dance when she is being petted. She also likes it when people talk to her. She likes to give licks and kisses. Faces are her favorite, but she also licks my husband Robert's feet when he is sleeping.



We call Mopsie "Boo Bear" because she looks like a bear when she is playing. Toys are not her thing, but she loves blankets and pillows and digs them into a mound to lie on to 'survey' her kingdom. She is the queen of our house. Her age is estimated at 13 but she often acts like a young dog.

Mopsie has a refined palate and prefers chicken and freeze dried turkey for snacking. Her nose works very well and we have to hide her medicine in peanut butter or she will eat around whatever it is hidden in and spit out her pills. Her stomach tells her the time. She always knows when it is time to eat.

## COCO by Sandra Free

Coco, a shih tzu, was left at a shelter at the age of 13. ODH heard about her and thought they could help with her physical problems and find her a forever home. Her problems were severe; she was blind in both eyes, deaf, had skin issues, and had many rotten teeth.



She came to our house in January of 2017 and by April was doing beautifully. She immediately went to see the vet and from there to the ophthalmologist. Her eyes were a mess, and didn't look normal at all. She had severe dry eye in both eyes and glaucoma in one. Because of the pain she was in, the ophthalmologist recommended that both eyes be removed as soon as possible. Coco also had many teeth that were causing pain and also needed removal. The concern was that she might not be able to withstand the anesthesia during surgery but she is so strong in all the inside areas of her little body that she did beautifully and after her ordeal, she seems to be pain free.



Wow! What a difference it has made in her life. Coco has never barked, but now makes wonderful sounds to communicate her happiness. Her tail also wags when she is getting pets and love. She gets lots of loves. A favorite thing for her to do is to be out in the sunshine soaking up the warmth. She raises her head up and you know she's smiling on the inside. Her most favorite thing is to eat her meals and treats. Because

there are few straight lines in our house, she nudges walls, cupboards, and furniture, but never hard and she gets better at finding her way as we go along. We've also had some success with her ear infections, and continuous good food is healing her skin.

Coco has a younger brother that she is getting closer to with time. We visit grandchildren on a regular basis and she enjoys the car rides as well as the different environment. Her ODH mom loves her dearly and smiles and laughs at her various antics. When she is held now, she can relax and make her great snuffling sounds. ## NEWS FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As we close April and I tally up the number of dogs that came to us this month, I notice how many of them were in need of immediate and very serious medical care. This is frequently the case now: dogs come onto our waiting list BECAUSE they have expensive medical problems that the owners can't or won't handle and that preclude adoption. Who wants to take on a dog that will cost a lot of money to fix or even treat for a while? Here are examples of dogs coming to ODH during the last two weeks and what has been done for them in just a short time.



Lorenzo is an adorable little westie that has chronic ear allergies that have now closed off his ear canals, preventing effective treatment of the constant infection. He is scheduled to see an animal allergist with special equipment for ears, and treatment will be an ongoing project. In his intake exam, an unusual heart arrhythmia was heard so he had a thorough workup by a cardiologist. Lorenzo was diagnosed with Sick Sinus Syndrome, which perhaps can be managed medically with compounded drugs. Despite all this, he's a VERY happy, charismatic little quy!



Schnitzel is a darling mini dachshund (How did you guess?)that came to us because the shelter vets found two mast cell tumors. On our vet's exam, unfortunately, MANY tumors were found all over his body— too many to remove all of them. We've removed a few for histopathology and the oncologist will use that to determine how advanced the cancer is and whether electrochemotherapy or some other treatment might be effective. He is otherwise healthy so we will do our best for him.

Evan (Sorry— no photo available) is an old and wobbly little shih tzu that came to us because of some very concerning values in his shelter labwork. A radiologist performed an abdominal ultrasound the morning after arriving in his ODH home; results indicated severe gastroenteritis or Inflammatory Bowel Disease, so he went home to recover from kennel cough and start dietary management. If that doesn't do enough he will need an endoscopy done by a specialist. He's a cheery little fellow whose personality is showing as he feels better; we are relieved that his prognosis is good.

These dogs are all worth the effort and the expense! We at ODH are so grateful to those who donate so we can give the dogs a chance for a comfortable, happy last part of their lives, after they lost all of their world and landed in a shelter. No matter how kind the shelter staff and volunteers are, being in a shelter is terrifying. We are glad to give them a family for as long as they are happy. And we are tremendously grateful to the ODH foster families who take in these dogs, get them to unending vet appointments and do all the treatment. The ODH community is simply remarkable.
