She came home in January 2018 and has had quite an exciting year, so I thought I might update everyone on her progress and show how an old dog still has so much life and love to give. With patience, love, and medical care, a scared, hurting "old" dog can blossom into a fun, wiggly little ball of love just



raring to take another stab at life! (The key word here is LOVE.)



Thanks to ODH, Bug had her right eye removed, a spay, treatment for arthritis and degenerative disc disease in her spine, and three bad teeth (plus a root hunk!) removed. It took eight months of vet visits, but as of September she is finally 100%!



During the summer, Bug went with me on a bucket list trip: a road trip, camping up and down the Pacific Coast Highway. It was perfect for her because Bug just adores spending time outside, and she acclimated to the road/camping life pretty quickly. She made an absolutely wonderful road dog! In fact, she pouted for about two weeks straight once we got home when she realized the trip was over. I had to make it up to her with lots of area hikes during the summer and fall!



I went back and forth over two days deciding if my heart could take the risk of this guy coming to me and then not being able to be brought back from his horrifying condition. But I decided if I wanted to be





involved with Old dog Haven, I must take the good with the bad. So I decided to bring him home, love him, feed him and do exactly what Judith and the vet told me to do.



I picked him up myself on August 31th, and had to drive home with the window down because his smell was so bad. I will always remember that day when my husband came in the door from work and asked, "What is that smell?" Uh honey, that's our new dog. LOL



He was covered in yellow, nasty, yeasty scabs. He had almost no hair, there was green pus in both his ear canals, he had goopy infected eyes, luxating patellas, bent elbows, a swollen snout from the infection in his mouth, and black teeth. He was also very emaciated (5.2 lbs). Oh no. Is he aonna make it?

He had five vet appointments in September with the best vet ever. I was given a bag full of meds and shampoos and lots of instructions. I was very lucky because Monte is a

great eater, so there were four small meals a day for my little prince. He started gaining weight right away and thankfully did not fight me on any of the meds he had to be given several times a day, including eye drops.

We had a setback when Monte decided to eat his own poop. He got really sick but thankfully responded quickly to the meds prescribed. Monte had fewer visits in October and his ears finally cleared up after three bottles of antibiotics. His hair started to grow a little peach fuzz and his legs were better because some muscles were building up. His little eye ulcers, after three bottles of medication, still were not getting any better so he'll be seeing an eye specialist. Dangit. He was cleared for his dental and that will happen in January, and he'll probably lose all of his remaining teeth.



Today, after 11 weeks, Monte is hardly recognizable from his intake pics. He is 7.4 lbs (his goal weight), his ears are cleared up, he's walking and running with no obvious pain, and he has hair everywhere except on his neck and chest (maybe a Chihuahua thing).



He is such a joy to this family; I have not regretted getting him for one second. Over the last few weeks he is starting to play with me and will chase me around outside. He is the perfect example of a dog's forgiving nature because he had a horrible thing happen to him but he is still wanting love and gives love back to his people. I

hope to have him around for years but if it's only months, I will never forget this funny little man. Thank you Old Dog Haven, Judith, and the vets for all the help and advice to get him healthy.



P.S. His name is actually Monte Bones. My three-year-old granddaughter took one look at him and started calling him Bones. The nickname stuck, so it's Monte Bones. It's funny and cute, but actually really sad that a small child could recognize what terrible condition he was in.



REMEMBERING LESLIE JENSEN

ODH mourns the passing of Leslie Jensen, an enthusiastic foster mom and dedicated transport volunteer. She and her partner, Bob Bodkin, made countless transports from their home in Bremerton to destinations in the Olympia area and other locations. Leslie always rode shotgun so she could cuddle and reassure the dog they were transporting.



Thank you Leslie. We're absolutely sure you had a welcoming committee too as you moved on to your next expression of spirit.

Leslie's partner, Bob, writes the following. What he says will make you smile and perhaps look at the word a bit differently.

"I hope you ALL have a little red heart on your driver's license, beside which is the word "Donor." Leslie did, as do I. The fruit of that commitment was that even being a cancer survivor, with health problems serious enough to cause her untimely demise, Leslie was able to donate her corneas. Within hours of her death on November 2nd, 2018, her corneas were removed for ultimate reuse.

"Fast forward to a few days later. Leslie loved plants and flowers, and our dining room is a virtual hot house of beautiful indoor specimens, many of which bloom from time to time. Specifically, Leslie was nurturing along several Christmas Cactus starts, which adamantly refused to bloom under her care, for years. However, shortly after her passing, I noticed the most remarkable change. Blooms on these same reluctant cactus plants were abundant, and I was happy to see them, but sad that Leslie had missed this touching tribute to her care.

"It then occurred to me that a marvelous opportunity had been created. I wrote to the folks who had overseen the donation and reuse of Leslie's corneas, asking them to

share several pictures I took of these beautiful, delicate flowers, as well as some pictures of Leslie with shelter-pull rescue dogs we transported on behalf of Old Dog Haven. This transport role was a joy to Leslie, and we always were happy to be so involved. My idea was that the people (two successful transplant recipients) who now could see, were seeing through Leslie's eyes! If they were able to see my photos, it would be—at least to me—just as if Leslie herself were seeing this floral tribute to her love.

"Yesterday evening, I got a voice mail from Rebecca Grossman, at SightLife, who wanted to share the result of my effort. We spoke this morning, and the most awesome story emerged. It seems that both Leslie's corneas were sent to Syria, and Dr. Tarek, who had done the surgeries, was able to show my photos to one of the recipients. Not only did he confirm this "sighting," but he made a short video of this lady, and I was able once again to look into Leslie's eyes!

"Just as I love to return, again and again, to Truk Lagoon, Leslie remembered with great fondness her sojourn to Africa, and would have gone back there again, had time and circumstance allowed. She was truly adventurous, having worked on Alaska's North Slope for several years, and would be very happy and excited to be looking out at Syria through the eyes of a survivor in that sad, dangerous, once beautiful country. The spoken words are not in English, but I swear I heard "Leslie" in the sound track...

"She loved hummingbirds, and our water feature in the back yard is a bathing/ drinking spot for all manner of birds. I saw a hummingbird there yesterday, and hope that Leslie saw her (drab green color indicated a female) too, through my eyes. I never see hummingbirds but what I think of her..." Bob
