VIOLET ROSE

Violet Rose, a very tiny little Chihuahua, was rescued from the shelter and there was no history of any kind about her. The staff at the shelter realized she had a serious disability and contacted Old Dog Haven. Violet Rose was evaluated by a neurologist and diagnosed with C1-



C5 myelopathy. Her gait is very unusual. Basically, she cannot walk but she does hop some. She was emaciated, which caused generalized muscle atrophy. The cause is unknown. She also had a large inguinal hernia and an ultrasound showed she needed a spaying. In addition, she had dental disease.

I was honored to be chosen as Violet's foster mom, and she became part of our family on July . I gave her the name Violet Rose. She sees her vets for vaccines and routine care, but the inguinal hernia was affecting her bowels so it had to be dealt with immediately and in order to know if she could tolerate anesthesia, Violet Rose was referred to a specialty center for a consult with a neurologist. He confirmed that her issue is most likely a cervical fracture which affects her mobility as well as her odd bark. The good news was that there was no brain lesion so she could have surgery, which also involved being spayed.



The challenges involved in getting Violet
Rose to gain weight have improved with an
introduction to another Chihuahua—Olive—
in September. Even though we have other
dogs, Violet Rose needed a dog close to her
size. Thanks to Judith's idea, Violet Rose no
longer takes four hours to get a few

tablespoons of food down. She tries to copy Olive in walking and eating. They are now inseparable. Violet Rose still faces challenges walking and tires easily, (two feet knuckle and one back leg doesn't bend) but she can wag her tail like a propeller. Perhaps when she's stronger she'll be able to use a

specialized wheelchair. Violet Rose has gained about five ounces and now weights four and a half pounds.

The next step will be to care for Violet Rose's teeth, which will happen this month. She probably won't have any teeth left after her dental, but that won't slow her down.

Despite her neurological disability, Violet Rose can look forward to a long happy life. Both Violet Rose and Olive have brought smiles to the people they meet.

Without Old Dog Haven, dogs like Violet Rose would most likely never get a forever home and the health care they need. Old Dog Haven pays for all vet bills. All donations to ODH make miracles like this happen. Thank you.

Sissy's lifetime owner was leaving the country and could not bring her along. She told us that her family had raised Sissy but the kids had left the house and no one in her family wanted Sissy because "her breathing is hard because she is overweight." Even though her lifelong family felt this way, we say that we won "the Sissy lottery!"





Sissy was indeed very overweight; upon intake she weighed 108 pounds. When she was surrendered she was flea infested, horribly matted, and in truly awful shape. In spite of her neglected condition, Sissy was a dear, sweet, easy patient for the vet techs as they worked on her to shave her mats, cut her long nails, clean and treat her ears and do what needed to be done to help her. Testing found she had Cushing's

Disease, high blood pressure, hypothyroidism, arthritis, infected ears and a UTI. It's no wonder her breathing was "hard!"




Because of the extra weight she carried, Sissy had a very hard time getting up and down and even walking for any distance. We knew gradual weight loss through diet and gentle exercise would be best for her and over a few months time, Sissy started to lose weight. She was treated for her UTI, started on thyroid supplement, high blood pressure medication, medication for the pain from her arthritis and treatment for her Cushing's Disease.

Recently Sissy had a large benign growth taken off her lovely face. She has had terrific veterinary care, thanks to Old Dog Haven donors, with special thanks to a donor we call Sissy's "Fairy Dogmother," a woman who is a lover of golden retrievers.



Sissy now weighs 72 pounds. She no longer has high blood pressure. She will always have Cushing's but she is currently symptom free. Sissy takes walks with her forever foster dad through their property. She has a special spot she likes to do happy rolls in, kicking all four of her legs in the air while she's on her back. Sissy and her foster dad Rick have a very special bond.



This very special girl is just about perfect in every way. Sissy is excellent with the group of little old dogs with whom she shares her home. She has been wonderful with our grandkids when they come to visit. She rarely ever barks, but when she does, there's a good reason for it! Sissy is such a GOOD GIRL.

In December 2019 Sissy turned 14, which for a golden retriever, is guite an accomplishment. Of course we hope for a lot more

time with our "Sissy Girl." It's remarkable how we can fall so in love with these old dogs that come to us in the twilight of their lives. They become part of our family and we can't imagine how anyone could have ever parted with them. It's definitely "our gain" and we are so grateful.

WE REMEMBER KAYCEE

When she was brought to the shelter as a stray shelter staff estimated KayCee's age as 11 or 12. KayCee weighed about eleven pounds, could barely see, her head was hanging down from pain, one of her eyes had ruptured from glaucoma, the other one was swollen with



corneal edema, she was severely anemic, she had abscessed teeth, had never been spayed, and had a serious heart condition. The procedure of removing KayCee's badly damaged eyes went so quickly and so well that the vet decided she could also be spayed at that time. As the vet tech was shaving KayCee's stomach, she felt something odd in KayCee's belly. An X-ray was immediately taken and two



perfectly formed puppies were seen on the film. 10 days later KayCee gave birth to two puppies. How she survived not only the surgery but carrying puppies to full term in that condition just astounded all of us. What a survivor. For years KayCee was ODH's longest resident and oldest dog until she moved on to her next expression of spirit in November 2019.



KayCee had a calm, nurturing temperament which she shared with the residents of Clearbrook Inn who all loved her and valued her time with them.

Being blind was never a problem for KayCee because she saw with her heart. She had no fear of people, especially young people. She especially loved teenagers, and they were so taken with her they took videos and photos of her all the time. Something about her reached out to them.





KayCee loved attending ODH functions, especially the Walk where she was crowned "oldest dog" several years in a row. Her foster mom says that she "always knew she was with her people, and she knew exactly where she was when we went to any ODH function. She

had a lot of energy for this type of thing. She had a very soft, beautiful personality and instantly mesmerized everyone she met. It was pretty amazing to watch."





KayCee had a truly wonderful life. She was a gentle spirit that taught us the value of living in the moment and seeing with our hearts. We all celebrate KayCee's presence in our lives, and are grateful she was able to stay as long as

she did. She was a perfect example of the difference ODH can make in the lives of unadoptable senior dogs.
