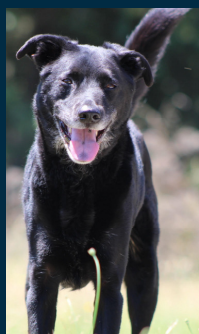

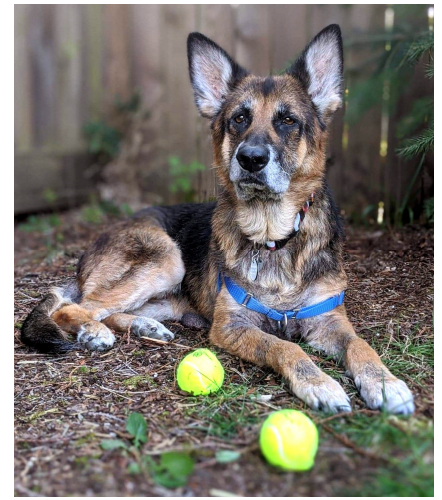

Soon after we got her, Mishka was diagnosed with heartworm and we started treatment immediately. Unfortunately, she also had some severe skin issues that could not effectively be treated at the same time as the heartworm due to conflicting medication issues.

Early on in her treatment, her medication made her extremely food-motivated and she ended up getting into our other dog's treat-flavored pain medication. She had to spend two nights in the emergency hospital under observation and was very excited to come home in good health!



After a lot of hard work she tested negative for heartworm earlier this year and we started to address her skin issues. Unfortunately, she has a strong antibiotic-resistant skin condition, which means she had to see a dermatologist to try to get

the itchiness under control. She is currently taking both Apoquel and Cytopoint injections to help her be less itchy, and this seems to be working well for her for the time being. She has also put on a healthy amount of weight over the last year and her coat is getting very full.



Personality wise, she is a big goofball who likes to bury her face in the carpet and headbutt people she likes, almost like a cat.

She is a total daddy's girl and likes to run errands with dad and patiently waits in the car for him to return while he quickly runs into the store. When we leave her at home, she sits in her spot by the window where she can watch for our return, then greets us with whines of joy like we had been gone for days.



She is very food motivated, and wants to be wherever we are in the house, even following us around like a little shadow. She has recently learned to fetch and a couple other new tricks (trying to learn 'speak' right now). She seems really happy and is a wonderful addition to our family. She and our other dog Casey (who just turned 14!) get along well.

Thank you Rachel and Brandon for taking such good care of this beautiful girl. What a transformation!

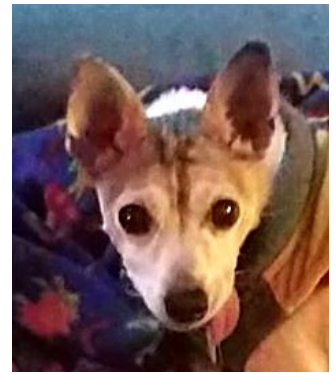

Max, at 15, was left at the shelter as a dog that needed dental help, pain relief and a loving home. He was not a good candidate for finding what he needed, so Old Dog Haven stepped in and pulled him.



I was the lucky one to become Max's guardian. When he came to my house, he had a blank, vacant stare, was disengaged and not confident. I had five Boston terriers of various ages, and coming into an established "pack" can change a dog immensely and I saw this happen with Max. There is a pecking order, and once a dog has found his place, he feels more secure.

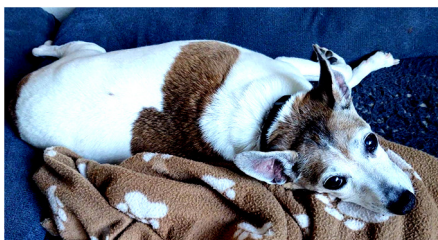


Max has been here for over a year now. The changes have been astounding! His eyes are clear and bright. He is very engaged and alert. He has personality! He has a place he can count on and feel safe in a home.

I call him "my old dog with a long nose" because he nudges me for pets with his pointy nose. He is a Seahawks fan! Truly! When I watch the Seahawks, he comes down from upstairs where his bed is and stays by me the entire game. It has become a routine!



Old Dog Haven took care of his bad mouth. Max has no teeth now, so his little tongue always hangs sideways out of his mouth. He is cute as cute can be. He is on medication to keep his aches and pains under control. He would scream out in pain in the beginning, which was heartbreaking, but now he has no more pain episodes.



Max loves fleece blankets...he has many. Max likes to be upstairs and have his own space (with three beds to choose from) in my bedroom. Max (and my other four dogs) sleep on my bed all night. Max cannot jump off the bed, so he lets me know (by barking) when he wants to get off.



I have learned a bit about Max's story through Max. He does not like men, perhaps because he had a bad experience with a man. This makes having a handyman over difficult, but if I hold Max and/or put him on my bed, he is fine. He loves attention when He wants attention. He barks when he has something to say. He loves his mealtime. He wants to be counted in for dog treats, dog chews, anything, teeth or no!

Most importantly, Max wants to be seen, loved, cared for and given a way to live out the rest of his life. I am honored he can do that with me.

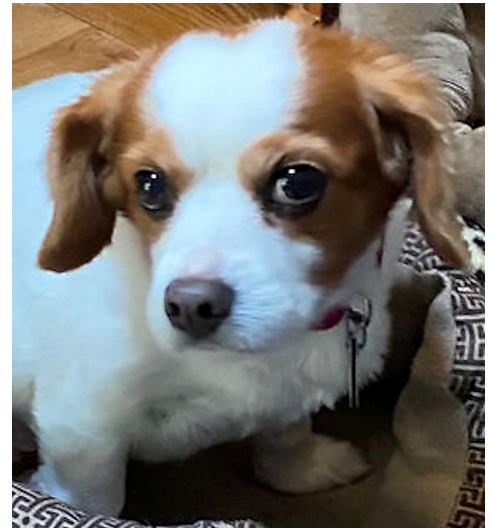

Tracy is supposed to be a Cavalier King Charles spaniel, but must have something else in there.

She came to us in a similar way to quite a few other ODH dogs: Her owners found she needed expensive vet care right away, and couldn't or wouldn't pay for it so they left her with the veterinary clinic. This was the clinic that has seen more than 1200 ODH dogs over 16 years, and when I showed up for an appointment that day I was tackled—well, sweetly asked—to look at this cute dog. Very cute indeed!



But, she needed immediate surgery to remove bladder stones threatening to block her urinary tract. How could I say no? So, of course, I signed the papers and authorized surgery, and one of the great doctors stayed late to do the cystotomy.

The problem was that I didn't have a foster with room and capability nearby who could pick her up that night for recovery at home, so Tracy came home with us and moved right in. We have taken a lot of dogs through this surgery, and Tracy recovered far more easily and quickly than any other dog. She must have been VERY UNCOMFORTABLE before! By the time she was recovered, she was part of the family and stayed with us; what a surprise.

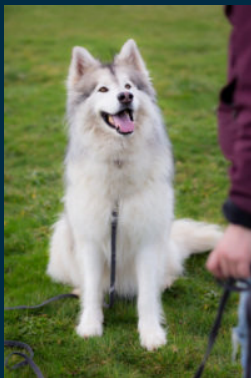
She had been clipped fairly short all over, but has now grown out a lot of feathers, which make her even cuter. She is energetic, friendly to all, a good cuddler, and very well behaved. She gets along with all the dogs, and the ancient kitty, and loves playing in our big pasture.



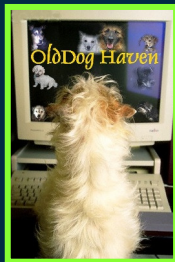
We have worked on a long-ago-damaged ankle that made her sore on walks, but with medication and supplements she is now comfortable on quite long and vigorous trips on the trail.

She will be on prescription bladder diet all her life and will have very frequent urinalyses and x rays to look for more stones. Definitely worth the investment, she's such a joyous dog and such a light in our lives. Sometimes being a sucker for old dogs is very rewarding!

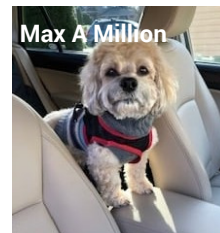

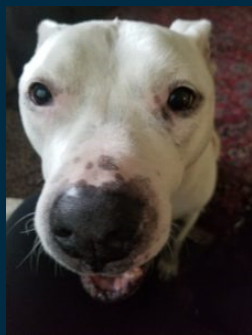


Max A Million
